



What's Up With Our Alumni Political Candidates!

As we sit on the eve of our county and community elections, it should come as no surprise that two of Leadership's own alumni are both running for office hoping to make an impact and

continue the legacy of leadership of having alumni bridging over to the political field. Read on to learn more about the two candidates and be sure to vote if you haven't done so already!

Tana Toly, City Council Candidate, is a familiar voice within the leadership ranks. An often-seen face in the community,

1) What is the platform you are running on? Conscious Community Connection

1. TRANSPORTATION!!! It's the #1 Issue we need to fix and we need to think Bolder than Buses.

2. REGIONAL PLANNING Strategic Goals and Comprehensive collaborative plans with our county and the Wasatch back in regard to sustainable land use and transportation. It is imperative for the regions success that we also must repair our relationship with the county

2) How do you plan to involve residents in the decision-making process of Park City?

- We are one of the smartest and most innovative communities out there. There are so many local experts that need to have their expertise used in decision making. We don't always need to hire the big consulting firms who don't know our values and goals, sometimes all it takes is looking at your neighbors expertise.

- I would like to ensure we make the big decisions facing PC residents more easily available. Our City Council packets are on average 400 pages and we need make these more palatable and easier to find for residents.

- I would like the Planning Commission or city staff to go on KPCW and give a report after their meetings. We have huge developments right now in front of the commission and the city needs to understand what happens in each of these meetings

- I would like to expand the "coffee with council" concept with more casual family friendly events that encourage dialogue but don't limit who can attend do to childcare restraints.

- During the campaign my grandmother and I did historic walks of old town. Those who attended learned about PC History and were able to ask me questions. We also did family pizza parties. More of these types of events would engage a more diverse group of people to express their thoughts on PC. 3) What are your favorite places to spend time in Park City?

- Watching the sunrise from one of my five favorite hiking locations

- The top of any ski run

- Taking my niece and nephew on the trolley and exploring main street/ the rail trail that connects to Main Street

- Running on Treasure Hill Trail
- Eating or coffee at one of our amazing local businesses 4) What's important for Park City right now?
- That we all have a say in shaping our future. The town we were 2 years ago is not who we are now and it won't be who we are in the post covid world.
- Finding long term solutions for transportation, not band aid fixes
- Repairing the relationship with Summit County Council
- Maintaining a balance between residents and businesses

Nann Worel, Mayoral Candidate has been a staple on Park City political scene since 2011. Serving on the Park City Planning Commission from 2011 until her successful run for City Council in 2016, and again in 2019. The below was taken from Nann's website.

1) What moved you to run for Mayor? We need a different style of leadership at City Hall. The tone of the city is set at the top. Legitimate public process and inclusive community require a Mayor who is willing to listen, learn and then lead. I will introduce a transparent, pragmatic, and collaborative leadership style to the mayor's office. All voices in the community matter, and I will find ways to ensure they are heard.

2) You have a 100 days plan. What does that entail? I am well versed in our community issues and process, well informed on our diverse community's shared concerns, and ready to hit the ground running to help deliver on the critical and visionary changes Parkites are demanding. Our quality of life and community sustainability depend on all of it.

The core tenants of the plan are as follows, Regional Relationships, growth, soils, environmental leadership, equity and transparency.

REGIONAL RELATIONSHIPS

- Repair the relationship with Summit County and engage Wasatch County to enlist the regional support we need. Without functional relationships with these key partners, we simply will not make meaningful progress on our most urgent issues including affordable housing development, traffic mitigation, carbon sequestration, energy usage reduction, managing growth, and workforce retention.
- Prioritize local, innovative transportation solutions that function in harmony with regional transportation networks and goals.

GROWTH

- Begin work on updating the General Plan to provide a clear foundation for our critical community priorities and the Vision 2020 pillar that is Sustainable Tourism.
- Work directly with Summit and Wasatch Counties on an overarching regional plan for all the development previously entitled inside and around 84060.
- Bring our ski resorts and biggest developers to the table to collaborate on ways to improve

connectivity and minimize development impacts to residents.

SOILS

- Reconvene the Blue-Ribbon Commission on Soils to define a long-term soils mitigation strategy.
- Pursue current testing of the Arts district and other soils to confirm for the community exactly what we are dealing with.
- Reestablish City Hall's relationship with the EPA and examine the possibility of re-opening the existing Richardson Flat repository.

ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP

- Focus on measurable carbon sequestration, air quality improvement, and energy reduction strategies to have the greatest impact over our immediate environment.
- Prioritize water usage reductions and improve fire prevention/mitigation techniques.
- Recruit a diverse community panel to address the environmental and sustainability impacts of proposed community projects, events, and general issues.

EQUITY

- Together with Summit County and other partners, establish a Blue-Ribbon Commission For Seniors to create a roadmap for addressing diverse senior issues including step down housing.
- Conduct Diversity, Equity & Inclusion training for all City Hall staff and Council to guide immediate and lasting policy change and help diversify hiring practices.
- Support the tremendous work of the City's LGBTQIA+ Task Force and establish dedicated Task Forces for each of our underrepresented communities in Park City.
- Establish a LatinX Leadership Park City program.

TRANSPARENCY

- Establish open office hours for the public.
- Pursue an internal organizational audit to ensure Park City Municipal Corporation is operating with the highest levels of efficiency and legitimacy for the benefit of our community shareholders.
- Make all Council materials easily accessible.
- Diversify engagement strategies far beyond the City website and social media to make sure all citizens are informed.
- Encourage open public process on all matters relating to our critical community priorities.

When elected, I will put together panels of experts in various fields to provide feedback and guidance in areas such as transportation, energy, planning, growth, development, economic investment, environmental sustainability, tourism management, public/private partnerships, negotiations, arts & culture, communications, and more.
